In today's Gospel, deeply impresses those around Him, not just by his miraculous actions, but by the authority with which he spoke. If Jesus speaks with authority, that means what He says about you is worth listening to, and worth believing in, much more so than what others think about you. The following are based on words from Scripture, God's words He wants you to repeat and believe about yourself:

"I am a Child of God." "I am precious in His eyes." "Nothing can separate me from the love of God in Christ Jesus." "I am God's treasured possession." "I am created in God's own image." "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me."



Take one of these statements, write it out and pin it somewhere you'll see it everyday, like your bedroom mirror, and ask the Lord to help you believe it on His authority, not yours!

Young Person's Prayer Dear God.

Help me to see myself as You see me. Help me to see myself as your beloved child. Teach me to know that my value and my worth does not depend on what others think of me. It doesn't even depend on what I think of me, because sometimes I'm my own harshest critic. Show me how to be the best version of myself - the ME you created me to be!

Gospel Reflection: Prophets of Our Own Time

A prophet is someone who speaks on behalf of God. Many of the great prophets accepted their role with great reluctance because it often meant adopting an unpopular stance. They did so because they had encountered God and their encounter with him was not something they could ignore or forget.

Moses could tell us a bit about this. God intervened in his life in the form of a burning bush. Moses was not perfect. He got hot-headed and lost his temper and God still chose him to lead the people of Israel from slavery in Egypt to freedom in the Promised Land. Moses had an important part to play in God's plan of salvation which would be fully revealed hundreds of years later with the coming of Jesus. Jesus is the fulfilment of all the Old Testament prophesies and expectations.

When Jesus came there was something different about him. Unlike all the Old Testament prophets who spoke on behalf of God, Jesus IS God (even the unclean spirit in today's Gospel recognises this and confesses that Jesus is the "Holy One of God"). Back in the day, it would have taken very lengthy prayers to expel demons. Yet, Jesus simply commands the unclean spirit to leave and it instantly obeys him. His power and authority come from being one with the Father.

Each one of us is called by God to be a prophet. God reveals himself to us and speaks to us, not on the top of a mountain as he did with Moses, but in our ordinary everyday lives. We encounter God in the people we meet in our day-to-day work and routines. We enter into God's presence is a special way at Mass, when we visit our local Church and when we say our prayers. Our God is not a distant God. He wants us to know and love him and for us to make Him known and loved by others. He is always trying to communicate with us – and he never gives up on us!
