### Talk

We see in this week's Gospel that faith is the first step towards being healed. Jairus wholeheartedly believed that Jesus would heal is daughter. Think about the following questions and discuss them with your family or a close friend:

- When you ask God for things in prayer, do you believe that He hears you and will always answer you? Can you share an example of a time when you asked God for something in prayer and he answered it?
- Where in your life do you feel Jesus is calling you to greater trust in his love and mercy?
- What does this story tell us about Jesus and his desire to heal us?
- What is one thing you are taking away from this week's Gospel?

## Family Challenge!

Make a special effort this week to pray for those you know who are sick and in need of healing. Consider praying a family rosary offering each decade for a different person or visit your local church to light a candle for them.

## Pray

Read the Gospel passage slowly. Use your imagination to pray with the Gospel. Close your eyes and picture the room in Jairus' home. Imagine that you are Jairus' daughter.

You are lying in bed, seriously ill. Pay attention to how you are feeling, and what you are thinking. What is happening around you? What do you hear? Imagine that Jesus comes into the room. What do you feel as he takes your hand? What does Jesus say to you? What do you say to Jesus?

Thank Jesus for coming to meet with you and for the time you shared together. Tell him what you need from him for your life at this time. Listen for his response. Close your prayer by slowly praying the Our Father.

### A WORLD IN NEED OF HEALING

The Gospel for this Sunday portrays an example of the healing power of Christ in an uncommonly moving scene. Jairus, a respected synagogue official, has a little daughter who is seriously ill. In desperation he seeks out lesus and begs Him to come to his house, to lay His hands on his daughter and cure her. Jesus responds without hesitation but, on His way to the child's home, news comes to say that the child is dead. To continue any further would be useless. But with calm authority Jesus calls for faith and proceeds to the house. In the quiet of the sick room, speaking only two words, He restores the child to full health.

The heart of Jesus could never resist an appeal for help made in faith. Healing was at the centre of His public ministry. He went round the whole of Galilee curing whatever illness or infirmity was among the people and filling them with the life-giving presence of God.

The Mission of the Church in every age is to continue the healing work that Jesus began through His miracles. Every Christian is called to this ministry in one way or another. The unique healing power of Jesus was in His willingness to show compassion. Nailed to the Cross on the Hill of Calvary, He pardoned the good thief even though he did not remove him from his agony. There can be no doubt that his sins were forgiven and that he was spiritually healed. Real healing so often takes place in doing the simple things of life, that are so often neglected or taken for granted.

All of us are called to represent God by Christ-like actions and nobody can be excused from caring because our vocation is to be healers. When a friend of ours is terminally ill, medical knowledge and skills together cannot make them well again. What they need more than anything else in this situation is the love of God be made real for them, through the actual experience of care and concern shown by the people round them. This passage reminds us of the generosity of Our Lord, and through Him we in turn are asked to go out and share that same richness with others.

Do you ever find yourself wishing for a different life, a different situation, different circumstances? Do you wish you could speed up the process and find out how things end, or what the outcome will be? Do you find yourself losing patience with God because He's not answering your prayers quickly enough? There's a story told of a little boy who got impatient watching a butterfly emerge from its cocoon. He decided to get a scissors to open the cocoon to allow the butterfly to become free more easily. But because the little creature emerged too early, its wings hadn't gained the strength they would from pushing their way out through the walls, and it didn't survive. All in good time - all in God's time.

In today's Gospel, we see Jesus on his way to heal Jairus' daughter, but by the time He eventually gets there, she has died, a tragedy for all there. Yet, Jesus had a plan all the time. Jesus worked an even greater miracle and raised her to life. He restored her to life, to her family, and increased the faith of the witnesses. God's timing can be different to ours. That's because He sees the bigger picture, always, in every situation. It can be difficult to trust in His timing and His plans, and yet nothing else really makes sense outside of them.

This week reflect back on your life, and try to see the wisdom of God's timing in your life. He knows when we are most ready.

# Now read Mark 5:21-43



- We're going to focus on the healing of Jairus' daughter, but before we do, let's spend a moment with the story-within-a-story here.
- Can you imagine the pain and shame the haemorrhaging woman had been feeling for 12 years? At the time she would have been labelled as "unclean" and been suffered both social and religious isolation, since anyone who touched her would also have been made unclean within that understanding. Imagine her desperation and her faith.

When you are hanging by a thread, make sure it is the hem of His garment.

#### NOTICE WHAT HAPPENS WHEN JESUS GETS TO JAIRUS' HOUSE, AMIDST ALL THE COMMOTION AND WEEPING: HOW DOES JESUS ACT?

- Jesus tells Jairus not to fear, but to have faith in him, even in a seemingly hopeless situation. He raises his daughter back to life.
- Jairus had his own plan. God had another. Did God respond to his request? Yes, just not in the way Jairus had planned.
- · God always responds, God always shows up, even if the answer isn't what we expected.
- Notice how Jesus treats Jairus' daughter with such

gentleness and tenderness, taking her by the hand saying, "Talitha Kum" / "Little girl get up." Imagine Jesus coming to you in your difficult moments where you feel you lack strength or the ability to press forwards, taking you by the hand and hearing him say to you, "Little Girl / Little Boy, Get up." Spend a little time journaling this.
