

WHY EXALT THE CROSS?

This week we celebrate the Exaltation of the Cross. Does that ever strike you as odd, that as Christians we would exalt the instrument used to torture and kill Jesus, our Saviour?

For Christians, the Cross is not a sign of shame or of defeat. The Cross is a sign of victory, since lesus defeated sin and death and rose again on the third day, opening the way to heaven for us. The Cross is the bridge between humanity and God - a gap we could never have crossed ourselves because of our broken and fallen nature, a gap that Jesus bridged in becoming man and offering His life in our place. Think about that when you make the sign of the Cross this week, or wear a Cross or see someone else wearing one, or look at a Cross hanging on the wall of your classroom, or workplace or home. Let the Cross and its meaning become part of your life this week: not just something to pay lip-service to, but a way to unite all your little inconveniences and sufferings this week to Jesus' suffering in an incredibly powerful prayer. Let's exalt the Cross this week, in our prayers, our attitudes and our daily offerings.

WEEKLY CHALLENGE:

Use this week's handout to guide your understanding of the Cross in your own life too, and be extra mindful whenever you make the sign of the Cross. Keep an eye out for where you can see a cross hanging this week!

Morning Offering: O Jesus, through the Immaculate Heart of Mary, I offer You my prayers, works, joys and sufferings of this day for all the intentions of Your Sacred Heart, in union with the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass throughout the world, in reparation for my sins, for the intentions of all my relatives and friends, and in particular for the intentions of friends, and in particular for the intentions of the Holy Father. Today's reading is the turning point in Mark's Gospel. In the presentation of the life and ministry of Jesus found in the Gospel of Mark, the deeds of Jesus have shown Jesus to be the Son of God. Yet many, including Jesus' disciples, have not yet realised his identity. In today's Gospel, Jesus asks the disciples what others say about him. He then turns the question directly to the disciples and asks what they believe. Peter speaks for all of them when he announces that they believe Jesus to be the Christ.

The word Christ is the Greek translation of the Hebrew word for Messiah, which means "the anointed one." At the time of Jesus, the Jewish people were waiting for the Messiah to come. There were many false expectations of what the Messiah would be like when he did come. Many people envisaged that the Messiah would be a strong political leader who would free the Jewish people from Roman occupation. Jesus does not appear to have used this term to describe himself. As we see in today's reading, Jesus refers to himself instead as the Son of Man, a term derived from the Jewish Scriptures.


Now that the disciples have acknowledged Jesus as the Christ, Jesus confides in them the outcome of his ministry: he will be rejected, must suffer and die, and will rise after three days. Peter rejects this prediction, and Jesus rebukes him severely. The image of Christ that Jesus is giving is not the image of the Messiah that Peter was expecting. Jesus then teaches the crowd and the disciples about the path of discipleship: To be Christ's disciple is to follow in the way of the cross.

We can easily miss the fear that Jesus' words would have evoked in his disciples. Death by crucifixion was all too familiar as a method of execution in Roman-occupied territories. It was also an constant possibility for the Christian community to whom Mark was writing. The path that Jesus was inviting his disciples to share meant tremendous suffering and death. This is the kind of radical commitment and sacrifice that Jesus calls us to adopt for the sake of the Gospel.



CHECK IT OUT: PRAY-AS-YOU-GO

Pray As You Go is a daily prayer session, designed to go with you wherever you go, to help you pray whenever you find time, but particularly whilst travelling to and from work, study, etc. Lasting between ten and thirteen minutes, it combines music, scripture and some questions for reflection. The style of prayer is based on Ignatian Spirituality.

THE RELIC OF THE TRUE CROSS VS THE CROSS THAT WE CARRY



Sometimes the Lord will give us the opportunity to mystically, mysteriously and truthfully share in the cross, but we run from it and do everything we can to avoid it.

Now Read Mark 8:27 - 35



Peter wasn't at all happy with the message that Jesus, His Friend and the Messiah, would have to suffer and be put to death. To die by Crucifixion was a horrific punishment inflicted by the Romans on the worst of criminals - it was a shameful death as well as a torturous one.

Peter tried to discourage Jesus from taking up His Cross and Jesus rebuked Him. While we can understand Peter's attitude, it's also important to always remind ourselves that Jesus sees the big picture. He told His disciples He would rise from the dead, but at the time they didn't grasp what that meant. His suffering was never going to be pointless or fruitless, and it was not something He would avoid. It was necessary to bridge the unbridgeable gap between God and humanity, to pay the price of our salvation. Our sufferings, when united with Jesus, can have great value too. Let's never forget that.
