Pray

In the Gospel today we hear Jesus speak strongly to the disciples after John complained about someone driving out demons in Jesus' name. Jesus responds to John by saying, "no one who works a miracle in my name is likely to speak evil of me".

Take some time this week to reflect on the key message of this week's Gospel. Think about the following:

- What is the Holy Spirit saying to you through this piece of Scripture? How do Jesus' words resonate with you personally?
- Do your choices reflect your relationship with Jesus? What sin(s) are you struggling with at the moment?
- When was the last time you received God's mercy and forgiveness in Confession? How do you feel about approaching Jesus and confessing you sins to him?

Talk

Jesus reminds us in this week's Gospel that we must have courage to speak on his behalf to others. He also tells us that many good and Godly actions are done by people who are not part of our Church. The spirit of God can move when and where the Spirit wills. Consider the following:

- Why do you think John was so upset by this man's actions?
- Reflect back on the last week. What are some examples of good deeds and actions that you witnessed or experienced?
- How have you contributed to the building up of God's Kingdom by your words and actions this week? Share one example that comes to mind
- What are some of the "obstacles" in your life that affect your relationship with Jesus? What steps can you take to remove these obstacles?
- What is your vision of Heaven? What do you imagine Heaven is like?

Family Challenge:

Pray in a special way this week for those who do not know God. Ask God to make himself known to those who do not believe or who have turned away from Him.

EVERY GOOD ACTION GRACES THE WORLD

In today's Gospel, the apostles are anything but pleased when they witness and outsider casting out demons in the name of Jesus. They were jealous and felt threatened, because this stranger was doing their work and yet was not part of their group so John made a complaint in the hope of having this stranger silenced.

John must have been surprised that Jesus refused to stop the man from doing good works in His name. Jesus made it clear that all good comes from God the Father and that doing charitable work was not the exclusive right of his followers. God moves where he wills and chooses whom he wills. God's spirit is at work beyond the confines of established religion. With the best will in the world, we cannot fall prey to the type of thinking and misguided notion that only the Church can contain truth and only its members can perform spiritual works. It is a temptation we all have. When we think along these lines, we are inclined to turn the Church in on herself and deny that great works can be achieved outside her influence.

We forget that an action can be good and Godly without being performed by a Christian. Goodness in the world comes from God and not from men. Even within the Church there is a temptation to form our own select groupings, to promote the club mentality which is basically about being in ourselves and keeping other people out. We've all witnessed unhealthy rivalry between different church organisations, and yet the aim of all is about furthering the Kingdom of God. The Gospel tells us that any person of goodwill doing their best to follow Christ's footsteps graces the world.

Every good deed contributes towards the battle against evil, so downgrading the motives behind someone's chargeable gestures amounts to spiritual begrudgery. God's action is not limited to any class of people. He may be sending his message to us in the most unexpected and tragic events to befall us. Goodness is where we find it. So let us all work in peace and harmony in the Church, ensuring the Gospel message is delivered more effectively. Amen.

CUT OFF MY HAND? SAY WHAT NOW?



In this Gospel Passage, Jesus highlights the consequences of our actions - be they good or bad. Even the most trivial good deed can have profound consequences - think of the difference a smile makes! In the same passage, however, Jesus highlights the importance of taking responsibility for our poor choices and habits too.

That's some pretty dramatic language there: If your right hand or foot causes you to stumble, cut it off! If your eye causes you to stumble, pluck it out! Jesus isn't asking us to maim ourselves, but He is speaking metaphorically and asking us to rid our hearts and our lives from anything that actually is causing us to stumble in our relationship with Him, with others and with ourselves. 


Fr Mike Schmitz: Venting or Gossiping?



WOULD YOU LIKE TO TRAVEL THE WORLD? BE KNOWN AS AN INFLUENCER? BE FAMOUS FOR SOMETHING? EXPLAIN YOUR ANSWER

WHO WAS ST THÉRÈSE OF LISIEUX?

Sometimes the unlikeliest of characters can have the greatest influence. Thérèse Martin was born in France in 1873, the youngest of a family of five daughters, and throughout her childhood was pampered, spoiled and prone to emotional outbursts



At the age of just four and a half, Thérèse tragically lost her mother, Zélie, to breast cancer. Her sixteen year old sister Pauline became like her second mother, and loss struck Thérèse again when Pauline entered a Carmelite convent five years later. The Carmelites are an enclosed order of religious sisters, so once Pauline entered, she did not leave Carmel again. She was later followed by Marie and Leonie

who left to join the Carmelites and Poor Clare orders, and Thérèse was now alone with her sister, Celine, and father, Louis. Thérèse was treated like a little queen by her father, and reacted over-sensitively to even the slightest criticism she received. She would frequently dissolve in tears, and was so sensitive that sometimes she would even cry because she had cried!


More than anything as a teenager, Thérèse wanted to join Pauline in Carmel, but the path would not be easy as she was too young, and so unable to control her emotions. Receiving a special grace during Christmas Mass 1886, Thérèse developed a strong will. That strength of character led her to even request permission

from the Pope in Rome to enter Carmel, and finally at the age of just sixteen Thérèse entered the enclosed order with her sisters Pauline and Marie, taking the name, "Thérèse of the Child Jesus and of the Holy Face".

Life in Carmel wasn't always easy for Therese and she suffered much there. Her father became ill and was taken to a mental hospital, and she couldn't even visit him.

She experienced a terrible dryness in prayer and eventually became very ill with tuberculosis, which

claimed her life at just twenty-four years of age. However, Thérèse's interior life and understanding of God deepened incredibly while in Carmel. She knew that as a Carmelite nun she could never perform great deeds or travel the world on mission. She understood however that her vocation was to love, and that she could show great love through small deeds: by simply doing ordinary things with extraordinary love.



Thérèse wanted to be a saint but she knew there was too much of a gap between her and the great saints. However, with her childlike faith, she also discovered what she called "her little way", a short and simple elevator to get to heaven: by allowing Jesus to lift her, like a father picking up a little child.

Most of the sisters saw nothing particularly special in Thérèse, except for her sister, Pauline, who knew that her little sister had developed an intense prayer life and an incredible inner sanctity that many could learn from. She requested Thérèse to write a journal of her memories and detail her "Little Way" so they would have something to circulate after her death. Her writings, emphasising her way of trusting in Jesus to make her holy, and relying on small daily sacrifices instead of great deeds, struck a chord with thousands of Catholics everywhere. Since then, millions of copies of "Story of a Soul" have been sold.



DID YOU KNOW?



· When Thérèse was a young teenager, she became so ill with fever that it was thought she would die. She suffered not just physical pains but was also tormented by hallucinations. Thérèse had a beautiful statue of Mary in her room, and once when her sisters were gathered praying for her recovery, Thérèse looked up, and later said that Our Lady smiled at her, and in that instant she was cured.

"If every flower wanted to be a rose, nature would lose

her springtime beauty."

Thérèse was often so tired from grief or suffering, that she fell asleep in prayer. She consoled herself by saying that mothers love their children as much when they are asleep in their arms as they do when they are awake, so God must love her during those times she fell asleep too!



- Thérèse became the patron saint of the missions, not because she ever went anywhere but because her love of, prayers for and letters to, missionaries. It's a good reminder to us when we feel like we can't do much, God can use the little we do to achieve great things.
- The Catholic Church venerates her also as the patron saint of florists, those who are sick and those who have lost parents. Why do you think Thérèse was chosen as patron for each of these? Why did her "Little Way" inspire the Church to name her "Doctor of the Church" also?
