Hear

Grab your Bible and look up the Gospel reading. Don't have one? No worries, you can find this week's readings online here.

Check out this video of the Gospel for children.

In the Gospel today we hear a statement of faith we're familiar with: love God and love your neighbour. Maybe we need to let it sink in a little deeper this week.

Take some time to reflect on the key message of this week's Gospel. Think about the following:

- What is the Holy Spirit saying to you through this piece of Scripture? How do Jesus' words resonate with you personally?
- What does it mean to love God with all my heart, my mind, my soul and my strength? Do I feel that my prayer life and the way I live reflects that? Ask Jesus to enlighten you in this.
- Jesus told the Scribe he was not far from the Kingdom of God. Looking at the way I live and act, could Jesus say the same to me? What changes might I need to make?

Talk

The scribe questioned Jesus about the greatest of the commandments, not to trick Him, or challenge Him, but because he genuinely wanted to learn, so he could be close to God.

Discuss the following as a family:

- Looking back on the past week, do you feel you were trying to be close to God? Can you give examples?
- Looking forward to the week ahead: how can we practically love Jesus with our hearts, minds, souls and strength?
- Who could our neighbours be, apart from the people who live next door! What ways this week can we try to love them as much as we love ourselves?
- We must also love ourselves, because God loves us! How can we have a loving attitude towards ourselves this week? What kind of things should we not say or not think?

Family Challenge

Make a decision this week that your home will reflect the Kingdom of God.

THE GREATEST COMMANDMENT

As we continue to read from Mark's Gospel, our Lectionary skips a chapter that helps set the context for today's reading. If we were to read the sections skipped (chapter 11 and part of chapter 12), we would hear about Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, his cleansing of the Temple, and the questioning of Jesus' authority by the chief priests, scribes, and elders. The context, therefore, for this Gospel is Jesus' growing exposure before the Jewish authorities. Jesus is being questioned and tested by the Jewish authorities, yet the scribe who addresses Jesus in today's Gospel seems to be an admirer; he is not testing lesus.

The question posed in today's Gospel requires Jesus to interpret the Law of Moses. The Mosaic Law consists of the Ten Commandments and many additional commandments, numbering into the hundreds. For a devout Jew, adherence to the Mosaic Law is an expression of faithfulness to God's covenant with Israel. The ranking of these commandments was regularly debated among the teachers of the Law.

Jesus was not the only Jewish religious teacher to connect these two commandments, love of God and love of neighbour. Both of these commandments were central elements of the religious tradition that Jesus learned from his Jewish community. Indeed, these commandments continue to be central aspects of contemporary Jewish religious understanding. Jesus' response to his questioners proposed an integral connection between these two aspects of the Jewish Law. Love of God finds its expression in our love for our neighbour. Many believe, however, that this connection was heard in a new and fresh way when spoken by Jesus.

The scribe who questions Jesus in today's Gospel engages in a positive dialogue with Jesus. He agrees with Jesus' teaching that the commandments to love God and love neighbour stand above the commandment to offer worship and sacrifice in the Temple. With this dialogue, Jesus appears to close the debate with the Jewish authorities. Mark reports that no one dared to guestion Jesus further.






CHECK IT OUT: THE FOYER OF CHARITY, DUNMORE EAST




