In the Gospel today we are presented with some stark images that could shake us from our comfort zones.

Take some time to reflect on the key message of this week's Gospel. Think about the following:

- What is the Holy Spirit saying to you through this piece of Scripture? How do Jesus' words resonate with you personally?
- When I hear about the Second Coming of Christ, what emotions do I feel? Am I afraid to meet Jesus? If so, of what? Am I excited to meet Jesus? The emotions you feel may give you a good indication of your relationship with Jesus at the moment.
- "My word will not pass away..." Is Scripture an important part of your life? Have you a relationship with God and His Word? Is Jesus calling you to spend more time allowing His Word to be a solid foundation in your life, no PAGE matter what each day holds?

Talk

The images in this Gospel are maybe a little frightening - it sounds a bit like a disaster movie! Jesus doesn't ever want to frighten us, but He does want us to keep focused on what is important, and make sure we are living our lives close to Him, his teachings and lives filled with love.

Discuss the following as a family:

- Look at some family photos over the years what kind of things have changed in your What kind of things have not family? changed?
- God's Word will never pass away. His love will never change. What kind of promises has God made to us? What can we be absolutely certain of with God and His love?
- If Jesus was to call to our house today, without warning, how would we feel? Would we be excited? Would we wish we were doing things differently, as a family, as individuals?
- What might Jesus say to us as a family if He called to us today?

Family Challenge.

Set aside a time in the week where you can read God's word as a family, even just for five or ten minutes. Pray, read, take some time in silence, and then share what you think He is saying to you.

SIGNS OF THE TIMES

This Sunday is the second to last Sunday of our liturgical year. As we approach the end of the Church year, our Gospel invites us to consider Jesus' predictions and teaching about the end of the world. In the context of Mark's Gospel, Jesus' words about this are spoken to his disciples as he prepares them for his passion and death.

Before we consider Jesus' words, it is important to note the political backdrop against which many think Mark's Gospel was written. Most scholars concur that Mark wrote his Gospel for Christians living in or near Rome about 30 to 40 years after the death of Jesus. This was a time of political turmoil in Rome. Some Christians experienced persecution by the Romans during the reign of the emperor Nero (about 64 A.D.). Jewish revolutionaries rebelled against the Romans, which led the Romans to destroy the Temple in Jerusalem in 70 A.D. In this time of political turmoil and persecution, many in Mark's community might have wondered if the end times predicted by Jesus were in fact quite near.

If we had been reading Mark's Gospel continuously, we would have heard Jesus predict the destruction of the Temple, his teaching about the costs of discipleship, and the woes that will accompany the end times. Finally, we would have heard lesus instruct his disciples about the need for watchfulness so that they will not be caught unprepared for this final day of judgment.

In today's Gospel, Jesus continues this teaching by offering his disciples signs to look for that will indicate that the coming of the Son of Man is near. His words and images draw upon Old Testament imagery, especially images found in the Book of Daniel. Next, Jesus offers the lesson of the fig tree, a parable that teaches that if one knows how to read the signs, one can be prepared for the end times. Jesus also teaches, however, that no one knows when the end time will come, except the Father. In the verses that follow this reading in Mark's Gospel, Jesus continues to warn his disciples to be on watch for this end time.

Jesus' words are not spoken to frighten his disciples, nor should they frighten us. Rather, they are offered to prepare us for the changes we will experience during our lifetimes and at the end times. Our consolation and hope is found in the lasting nature of Jesus' words and God's never-ending love for us.

His Word will never pass away. Even if everything else changes in our lives, His love for us will never change.

This week, reflect on how ready you are to meet Jesus, and what that even means to you. Are we living our lives with Him, trying to be the best version of ourselves? Or are we putting off change, and settling for mediocrity?



Take some time in silence, on your own, and allow yourself to reflect on the following. Imagine you are sitting at home in your bedroom, on a normal day, when you hear a gentle knock at your bedroom door. When you open it, you find yourself looking into the loving and tender smiling face of Jesus. What is your immediate reaction? Are you excited, happy? Do you hug Him, welcome Him to your home? Or are you worried, frightened for some reason? Do you hesistate to welcome Him in? Do you feel distant from Him, and unsure how to react? Talk to Him honestly in this moment about what His presence means for you. When you have finished talking, imagine His eyes looking into yours. What do you think He would say to you in this moment? How would He tell you that He loves you, that He gave His life, for you? How do you respond to His love? Do you need Him to help you accept it? Allow yourself, as much as you can, to feel His love for you.

Lord Jesus, I know that You see me as I am, that You know my heart, and You love me completely.

You are the one constant in this life. Help me to trust You totally, and to build my life on Your Word and Your Love. You are the Way, the Truth and the Life. Amen
