Pray

In the Gospel today we hear the story of Jesus proclaiming the prophetic words from the scroll of Isaiah in the synagogue.

Take some time to reflect on the key message of this week's Gospel. Think about the following:

- What is the Holy Spirit saying to you through this piece of Scripture? How do these words resonate with you personally?
- Imagine yourself in this scene: can you sense the atmosphere, all eyes turned on Jesus? How would He have read these words? How would your heart have reacted?
- Each of us have received the Holy Spirit at Baptism: pray about how the Lord is calling you to live out your baptismal calling this week - where can you bring the Good News, new sight, liberty - how can you set the downtrodden free? Who comes to mind?

Talk

Today's Gospel is a clear statement by Jesus of His mission, as foretold by the prophets, and the type of Kingdom He wants to build.

- Can you think of people in the world today who need help? Has your family ever done anything to help the poor and needy? Talk about these actions.
- Can you think of a time you received good news that made your whole day better? What news was that? Who told you the news?
- What message does Jesus have for people? Why do we call that the "Good News"? How did Jesus help others in the Gospels? Can you remember any stories that are like the passage Jesus is reading today from the Prophet
- We received the Holy Spirit at baptism we have been anointed to do these things too. How can we help others hear and see the Good News of Jesus this week?

Family Challenge!

Each day, begin with a prayer to the Holy Spirit to show you how to live out this week's Gospel, and who you can reach out to. Share your stories and encourage each other throughout the week!

ANOINTED BY THE SPIRIT

In last week's Gospel from John, we heard about the first public sign worked by Jesus at the wedding feast at Cana; "He let His glory be seen and His disciples believed in Him."

This Sunday we move to a public announcement by Jesus of His Mission in Luke's Gospel. Jesus has just spent forty days fasting and praying in the desert, having been led there by the Spirit, where He was tempted by Satan before returning to Galilee to begin His public ministry.

Imagine the scene: this enigmatic preacher stepping forward in the synagogue, taking the scroll of the Prophet Isaiah from their hand (Isaiah 61:1-2). As He selected the passage He wished to read, they must have wondered what He would choose that day. Can you hear the steady authority in His voice as He read the words written about Him centuries beforehand? Can you imagine the racing thoughts, the swirling questions, the bated breath? Can you sense the growing excitement and tension of the moment? Then He announces, "This text is being fulfilled today even as you listen." All eyes were fixed on Him. An epic moment in Salvation History, but let's not leave it there as a historical event. The question for us today is not how they reacted 2000 years ago, but how I react now? Do I believe this message is for me? Do I believe Jesus wants to set me free today, to fill my life with His good news?

Today we begin Catholic Schools Week 2022 - the theme for the week is 'Catholic Schools: Living Life to the Full. What is it for a Catholic to live life to the full? To accept the message of Jesus Christ and to bring it to others, surely. Look again at what the Prophet Isaiah foretold the Messiah would do: "The spirit of the Lord has been given to me, for he has anointed me. He has sent me to bring the good news to the poor, to proclaim liberty to captives, to set the downtrodden free, to proclaim the Lord's year of favour."

By virtue of our baptism, we too have been called to this mission, we too have been anointed by the Spirit and are urged forwards, out of our comfort zones, to bring this life-giving, life-changing message to all we meet. Are we willing to step up to our responsibilities as Christians, and share the treasures of our faith with others, in concrete and practical ways?

We are blessed with opportunities to proclaim the Lord through our words and actions each and every day, if we can just recognise them and choose to act. Let's tune our hearts to the Spirit's promptings, to see as Jesus sees, to love as He loves, and to free as He frees.





STOP WHAT YOU'RE DOING!

Are you someone who needs technology to set reminders for you? Many people today use their smart-watches, phones or Fitbits to remind them to stay hydrated, or to get up from their desks and move. It's good for our health and well-being. Some even set alarms when to go to bed, as well as when to get up! We often need something outside of ourselves to interrupt what we are doing and remind us of what's important - we can struggle with discipline and balance in our own lives. Life is busy and shows no sign of slowing down! Simple reminders or alarms are often necessary for our physical health, but also for our spiritual health too.

DONG - DONG - DONG!?

You might be familiar with the Angelus bell at 6pm on RTÉ 1. You may not be familiar with the origins of it however. Catholics have been praying the Angelus for centuries. The Angelus bells ring out three times daily around the world, to interrupt the daily routines of Catholics, reminding them to turn their thoughts towards God and heavenly things. Even non-Catholics can find the interruption useful, a call to lift oneself out of busy routines, and reflect on the important things in life, for just a moment.

TOO BUSY TO STOP?

We can always convince ourselves when we hear the Angelus bells that we're too busy at that moment to stop and pray, but adding a little discipline to our lives, creating a God-space for just 2 out of the 1440 minutes in each day, reminds us that we can choose how we order our day, and give a dedicated time back to God, in thanksgiving.

PRAYING THE ANGELUS

The prayer begins with the story of the Angel Gabriel visiting Mary. We walk with Mary from that moment of the Annunciation to the birth of Jesus, and then we remember how Jesus died and rose from the grave to save us because He loves us - that's definitely worth two minutes of reflection each day!
