Pray

In the Gospel today we hear about Jesus explaining the cost of following Him.

- What is the Holy Spirit saying to you through this piece of Scripture? How do these words resonate with you personally?
- It can seem like Jesus' answer is pretty harsh here. However He is not saying that our families are not important. Rather He's talking about the importance of putting God first. Being a follower of Jesus isn't easy. It takes real commitment. Reflect in prayer and what you might struggle with when following Jesus. Where in your life do you need more grace to let go and let God? What in your life are you putting in God's place?
- If one particular area is coming up for you as you reflect, bring that especially to Jesus in prayer this week. Ask Him how to be a committed follower of His.

Talk

In today's readings we hear about the radical call to discipleship.

- If you could only choose three foods to eat for the rest of your life, what would they be? What if you could only pick one - what would you choose?
- Every time we choose something, even choosing chicken nuggets rather than pizza, it means saying yes to one thing and no to something else.
- Following Jesus means we have to make a choice too. There are some things that help us to follow Jesus, and some things that make it more difficult. Can you name some choices that make it easy to follow Jesus? What choices make it difficult?

Family Challenge!

As a family this week, choose something that is good for your family to do together.

Also, make a choice that is helpful to following Jesus: e.g. pray morning prayer together, visit the Church, get to confession, say night prayer.

Do you know just how much God loves you? He knows that if you spend time with Him, and do what He wants you to do, it will make you happy! Is there something you can do this week to show God how much He means to you?

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THE COST OF DISCIPLESHIP

Today's Gospel reading begins a long section unique to Luke's Gospel. Jesus begins his journey to Jerusalem, which will end with his ministry in Jerusalem.

Immediately Jesus is met with rejection, as a Samaritan village will not receive him because he is going to Jerusalem. There was animosity between Samaritans who worshiped on Mount Gerazim and Jews who worshiped in Jerusalem. James and John want to call down fire from heaven to destroy the people in the village, but Jesus rebukes them and moves on. There is often the temptation to use violence to achieve right. Jesus has come to break this temptation. He is aware that he must undergo violence himself before he can enter his glory.

The rest of today's reading is about the radical demands of discipleship. The three people who volunteer to become disciples on this journey show that they do not understand the demands Jesus will make of them. Neither care of self, care for the dead, nor care of one's family (as required by the Fourth Commandment) can come before the demands of discipleship. Jesus reminds the first volunteer, who would go wherever Jesus goes, that animals in the wild have more security than do Jesus and his followers. The second, who wants to bury a parent, is reminded that the demands of proclaiming the Kingdom of God take precedence. And the third, who wants to say farewell to his family, is reminded that once you put your hand to the plow you cannot look back or the furrow will be crooked. Such a person is not ready for the Kingdom of God.

Jesus seems harsh here, but he is only asking of his disciples what he asks of himself. Jesus' unconditional commitment to God's saving work will demand of him his life. He knows this, but the disciples do not understand. Jesus does not want anyone to rush into discipleship, because the demands of discipleship require everyone considering it to be aware of the cost, make Jesus and his mission central to his life, and then go forward without looking back.

Following Jesus means being a nice person, recycling... that's about it really isn't it? Nope! If you read the Gospels, especially a Gospel like this one, you'll quickly see that Jesus places fairly hefty demands on His disciples! Is it all a bit too much? Well, let's consider what's at stake - heaven! So, no, the cost isn't really too heavy at all! Remember too, anything Jesus calls us to do is just what He has done Himself. He paid the ultimate cost, He gave all to His heavenly Father, He prioritised God the Father and His plan always, even unto death. It's not that Jesus is telling us that families are not important, or that we can't say goodbye to people. Rather, He's telling us that following Him requires radical commitment. Some commentaries of this Gospel say that the second man hadn't actually lost his father yet, that the verb used implies a future event where he would bury his still-living father... so he was really putting discipleship on the long finger! We will always find excuses not to follow Jesus, but living a double-life never leads to happiness. Choose Jesus first, put God first: I guarantee you will never regret it! The rewards are out of this world! :)
