


WHAT WOULD YOU CONSIDER THE WORST DATE? CONSIDER ATTITUDE AS WELL AS LOCATION ETC.

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LOVE GENEROUSLY

MATTHEW 5:17-37

Now Read Matthew 5:17-37

It's tempting to just do the bare minimum isn't it - whether it's chores at home, homework, assignments, even practicing our faith or saying our prayers.... It's tempting to reassure ourselves that we've done something, which is better than nothing, but deep down we know we're capable of more, and called to more too. Jesus understood this so well. He knew well

what the Law represented for the Jewish people, and how many had limited themselves to a minimalistic interpretation, but missed the whole heart of the matter: a loving relationship with God. Jesus Himself came to fulfil the Law, to show us how to live and love generously - just think of the love He lavished on us by giving up His life on the cross! We can't ever match His generosity, but we should try to love generously because He first loved us generously. Only when we open our hearts up to Him and to others will we ever really grow and become the best versions of ourselves. Let's live the commandments in a more complete and fuller manner: let go of hate and anger, of bitterness and impatience, of lust and selfishness, of pride and greed. Let's strive daily to love God with our whole hearts and minds - and ask Him for the grace to do just that!
