

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

WHO WAS CARDINAL VĂN THUAN?

Francis Xavier Nguyen Van Thuan was born on April 17, 1928 in Vietnam, the eldest of 8 children. Thuan's family had been Catholic for generations, and he was even related to martyrs in the past. He was raised in a deeply faithful environment, with his mother in particular being an incredible example of faith, teaching her sons Bible stories, stories of Vietnamese martyrs, the life and example of St Thérèse of Lisieux. She instilled in him too the value of love and forgiveness, which he would so greatly need later in life. Van Thuan loved his homeland of Vietnam dearly.

He was ordained a priest in 1953 and spent some time in parish life as well

as a hospital chaplain.

He then moved to Rome where he was recognised as a brilliant student and writer. He later returned to Vietnam where he was appointed Bishop in 1967. He chose as his motto "Gaudium et Spes" (Joy and Hope), because he desired to be an apostle of joy and hope.

On August 15, 1975, he was put under house arrest by the Vietcong, a Communist-led army and guerrilla force. His situation escalated when he was taken without trial to a prison in North Vietnam where he would spent the next 13 years, nine of which were in solitary confinement. During his years of imprisonment he wrote 'The Road of Hope', advice to all the Catholic Vietnamese in Vietnam and abroad, by using scraps of paper from a calendar block he received from some visitors before his solitary confinement.

In his early time in prison, he was confined in an extremely narrow space without windows, suffocating with heat and humidity, often finding it difficult to breathe.

In his own words: "They tortured me by leaving me under lights day and night for ten days and then depriving me of all light for long periods. One day in the darkness I noticed a tiny hole through which the light shone. From then on I used put my nostrils there to breathe more easily.

Whenever there were floods snakes used to invade my cells and sometimes climb my legs to avoid the water.... I had not toilet but since I received hardly any food I had little need of one.... Prayer saved my life. In moments of great suffering, sometimes when I wanted to pray I could not. I was desperately tired, sick and hungry... often I was tempted to despair and rebellion. But the Lord always helped me.'

Despite the brutal torture and dehumanization he suffered, Van Thuan always strove to love the very prison guards who abused him. Initially his guards were changed very 15 days, but the officials realised that he was converting these young jailers and so to avoid him "contaminating" others decided to leave those five with him. These young men became friends and students of Van Thuan, He spoke to them about his family, his travels. He taught them English, French and Latin. Although religious symbols were prohibited, he convinced one to bring him a little wood and he fashioned a cross. Another brought him some electric wire and loaned him a pliers for four hours, to enable him to make a chain for his cross.

Upon his initial arrest he was unable to take anything with him, but was given permission the next day to write to his friends to ask them to bring his clothes. He asked them to include some wine "as medicine for stomach aches". Using the wine and some tiny pieces of bread, Van Thuan celebrated Mass in his tiny cell with three drops of wine and one drop of water in his palm. "This was my altar, my cathedral."



Archbishop Thuân was released from prison in 1988 and then exiled from his beloved homeland of Vietnam in 1991. Pope John Paul II named him president of the Pontifical Council for Justice and Peace in 1998 and created him a cardinal in 2001. He died of cancer Sept. 16, 2002. Cardinal Van Thuan died in 2002 in Rome and was declared Venerable by Pope Francis in 2017. In spite of the persecutions imposed on the Church and on himself personally, he always lived and preached forgiveness and reconciliation.

Cardinal Van Thuan initially struggled to pray in prison, until he realised how closely God was with him, even in his darkest moments. One prayer he particularly loved to recited was the Litany of Saints, which he called his prayer for liberation:

PRAYER OF CARDINAL VAN THUAN: From all evil, Lord save your people. From every sin, Lord, save your people. From everlasting death, Lord, save your people. By your death and rising to new life, Lord, save your people. By your gift of the Holy Spirit, Lord, save your people.






Cardinal Van Thuan continued to write to his people while in prison, using scraps of paper from a calendar block. Writing down his thoughts helped him to cope with his confinement, and he found a way to keep encouraging the Vietnamese Catholics and remind them of the hope that Christians find in Christ Jesus, even in the midst of darkness and persecution.

Reflect on his life and legacy in the format of a letter to Cardinal Van Thuan. Maybe you could write about the challenges you face in your life, or the questions his story raised for you, or any aspect of his story that you found inspiring, or difficult to understand. The important thing is to respond personally and honestly - whatever form that takes for you!

Torgiveness is a big deal, so before we do any of these steps we need to ask for God's grace, for the Holy Spirit to help us, for Jesus to guide our thoughts and actions, and to trust in the Father.

Now Read Juke 6:27-38

This Gospel passage is a continuation of Jesus' Sermon on the Plain (or on the Mount depending on which Gospel you are reading). He holds up for us an incredibly high standard of living - the Christian standard: love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who treat you badly. This is tough, really

tough! Is it impossible? By human standards, yes, but by God's grace, thankfully no. Jesus calls us to love and view others as He does if we want to call ourselves a follower of His. Jesus calls us to give and not count the cost, or as we looked at in Fr Mike's video, to count the cost and still forgive. This passage directly follows the Beatitudes, the path to joy Jesus promises us. Lack of forgiveness can enslave us, hold our hearts hostage, eat away at our joy and our ability to love. This is not living life to the full. This is not a path to joy. Jesus also knows we're weak and frail. He modelled for us how to live this way by His own life and death. He promises us all the help that we need. If we wait until we feel like doing any of this, that feeling may never come. Love is a decision, forgiveness is a decision. If you are struggling to forgive, make a decision to set your heart free, by God's grace.





ARE THERE PEOPLE IN YOUR LIFE THAT YOU STRUGGLE TO FORGIVE? PEOPLE WHO HAVE WRONGED YOU AND HURT YOU? PEOPLE WHO OWE YOU A DEBT, WHO HAVE COST YOU SOMETHING IN YOUR LIFE? IF YOU FEEL LIKE YOU CAN START THE PROCESS OF FORGIVENESS, FOLLOW FR MIKE'S ADVICE. IF YOU STRUGGLE WITH THAT, BEGIN BY PRAYING FOR THE GRACE TO WANT TO FORGIVE THEM, AND COMMIT TO THAT PRAYER.

Jesus, You are the source of all joy and peace. You know that there are areas of my life and people in my life that have caused me pain, and it' can be difficult for me to forgive. I'm not sure if right now I even want to forgive. But I pray now for the grace to want to let your healing into my life. To make room for Your healing, I know there are things I need to let go of. Fill my heart with Your love, and grant me the grace I need to decide to take a step towards forgiveness today, no matter how small that step may be. Amen





