

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

"What's in it for me?"

Have you ever heard someone speaking that question, or have you ever spoken it yourself? Our world today can teach us to look out for Number One, to put yourself first or you'll be trampled on, to make sure you get what you want, no matter what the cost to others might be.

Yet Jesus calls us to a higher standard, because He knows we have been made for greatness, and part of that greatness involves dying to ourselves and serving others. As St Francis of Assisi said, "It is in giving that we receive, and in dying that we're born to eternal life."

Think about the kernel of wheat Jesus mentions in the Gospel today. A seed is not meant to stay as a seed, it's called to so much more, but there will always be an element of change and loss in that process:

For a seed to achieve its greatest expression, it must come completely undone. The shell cracks, its insides come out and everything changes. To someone who doesn't understand growth, it would look like complete destruction. (Cynthia Occelli)

We are sometimes called to say no to something so that we can say yes to something better. We will never regret saying yes to Jesus and what He wants for us.



YOU CAN BE A GAME CHANGER LIKE ST PATRICK




- Research the pilgrimage sites associated with St Patrick: Croagh Patrick and Lough Derg.
- Live courageously! When you feel you should speak up about your faith or to encourage someone else, ask God for the strength and words, and do it!
- Don't be afraid to embrace discomfort: St Patrick endured all sorts of hardship, not for their own sake, but as a way to prayerfully offer them to God for the building up of His kingdom. What could you offer up this week as a prayer for someone else? Say no to dessert? Offer to do extra chores? Get up 5 minutes earlier to pray? The list is endless!
- How can you bring the Gospel message to others this week? St Patrick used what he found around him. What could you use to kickstart a conversation with others about faith?
- St Patrick prayed as many as 100 times during the day and the same at night during his time of slavery. Where could you insert moments of prayer, little pauses, throughout your day?
- St Patrick's Breastplate: Maybe you could decide to use the words of St Patrick as your own prayer, asking Christ to be with you always in all you do and say!
