- What is the Holy Spirit saying to you through this piece of Scripture? How do these words resonate with you personally?
- Reread those words slowly: "I still have many things to say to you but they would be too much for you now." Have you ever experienced this in your own faith journey? Have you experienced the wisdom of God's timing when you look back on circumstances, events or things you have come to understand over time?
- Be ready to share the Good News! Where can you see God's hand in your life? If you had to share your testimony with someone, what key moments can you see God really at work in your life to date?

In today's readings we hear about the relationship between the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and the love they share between them.

- How does our family show love to each other? Are there particular occasions where we celebrate members of our family? How do we do that? Are there small gestures or acts of kindness that we do on a daily basis?
- God IS Love. Everything God does is done out of love for us. God the Father gave us Jesus to redeem us, and the Holy Spirit proceeds from the Father and Son as our Advocate and Guide. Where in our family can we see God's love for us, as a family and as individuals?
- When we love each other, we get to participate in that Divine Love too!

UNITY IN THE TRINITY

This week we return to the liturgical season of Ordinary Time. This Sunday and next Sunday, however, are designated as solemnities, special days that call our attention to central mysteries of our faith. Today, on the first Sunday after Pentecost, we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity. This feast invites us to consider what we believe about God, who has revealed himself to us in the Trinity—one God in three persons.

The verses of today's Gospel come near the end of Jesus' long discourse at the Last Supper. In the early part of this discourse, as we saw last week on Pentecost, Jesus offers assurances to the disciples. Even though he must leave the disciples, he tells them that they will have a future because of the help he will send them in the Holy Spirit. In this section he focuses more on the shape of the future, which will include Jesus' victory over the world that they will share in. The disciples of Jesus cannot know the future. They can only know that, whatever shape the future takes, they will not have to face it alone. They have the Spirit of Truth, who will continue to provide the teaching of Jesus in the future. Reading this passage on Trinity Sunday reinforces our understanding of the unity shared by the members of the Trinity. Although the idea of one God in three persons remains a mystery, we have the assurance that, as Jesus and the Father share all, Jesus and the Spirit share all.

Looking back on the day of their Confirmation, Bishop Phonsie wants to remind the boys and girls he met to pray every day. There is no app for joy and mobile phones do not bring the happiness we desire. Jesus is the only one who never abandons us.





You've probably heard those words hundreds if not thousands of times, and you've probably blessed yourself using those words too. Maybe we don't always stop to think what they mean. Firstly, we don't say "in the names" but instead just "name". Why? Because we believe in one God, not three, and we call that the Trinity. God is One God, in three persons. Sounds a little difficult? That's ok! The Trinity is one of the greatest mysteries of our Christian faith, but is the deepest reality, and actually the core of everything else we believe. We say that it's a mystery, not because God doesn't want us to understand it. In fact, it's the opposite. Christians know that God is One God in three distinct persons because God has REVEALED that to us. He WANTS us to know Him, as He is, not as we make Him up to be ourselves. God loves the world. That's an easy statement. God IS love. That's a little more difficult to comprehend. Saying that God IS love and that God IS a Trinity is effectively saying the same thing. God the Father loves God the Son, the Son loves the Father, and the love between them is so strong, it IS the Holy Person, Love personified. It can be challenging for us to understand this, and that's ok, but just because we don't always understand, that doesn't mean we should dismiss it

THIS WEEK:

- Make a conscious effort each time you bless yourself in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.
- Reflect on your understanding of each Person of the Trinity. Spend some time praying from your heart to each distinct Person of the Trinity: God the Father, God the Son, the Holy Spirit.


